Brief in defense of Baurel, Carpenter,
Defendant in the suit instituted against
him by Mr. Voix, merchant, plaintiff,
Filed before Mr. Delachaise, Spanish
Judge of this Province.

Defendant opens his brief with the statement that plaintiff's claim is a fraud and that it has no foundation except on plaintiff's greed for collecting money. Defendant then admits buying merchandise from plaintiff but declares that plaintiff knew then and knows now that these purchases were for account of Mr. Raguet. Defendant then refers in detail to the pleadings filed herein by the parties to this suit, and particularly does he call attention to the exhibit which shows that Mr. Raguet certifies that said goods were purchased for his account (all of which pleadings and evidence are contained on pages 95155 to 95177, inclusive) and in detail, defendant reasons that judgment should not be rendered against him, basing his arguments upon what would result in commercial affairs, should everyone employ the spurious method of book-keeping such as adopted by plaintiff. Defendant also discusses in detail, several of his own commercial transactions with merchants of the community, all of which were satisfactorily concluded and he declares that if plaintiff's claim were legitimate, it would have been recognized and paid.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
OF THE ALMSHOUSE OF NEW ORLEANS.

This day, July 2nd, 1769, at 4 P. M. at the office of the Board of Directors of the Almshouse a meeting was held to find ways and means to settle the claim of the Almshouse against the Capuchin Fathers.

The administrators, at the meeting of the 11th of last month called the Board's attention to the sum of 4766 livres 13 sols 4 deniers due by the Rev. Dagobert to the Almshouse for rent of a house which he is at present occupying. The Reverend Father Dagobert, unable to pay the said sum, claims that the parishioners should provide him with a residence, the rent to be paid by them, but there was not sufficient attendance to act at the meeting of the 11th of June, and in view of the pressing needs of the Almshouse the Procurator General suggested that Mr. Aubry, Knight of the Royal and Military Order of St. Louis, Commandant of the Province, and Mr. Foucault, acting Intendant and first Judge at the Superior Council of this Province, write a circular letter to all parishioners notifying them to be present at today's meeting to discuss the matter and find ways and means to raise the amount necessary to settle said debt, and the said Messrs. Aubry and Foucault having been willing enough to take the trouble to send the circular letter on the 19th of last month to engage the parishioners to come to the present meeting, consequently, there were present:

Mr. Reggio, former officer;
Mr. Dreux, former Administrator of the Almshouse;
Messrs. Olivier de Vezin, surveyor; Durel,
church warden; Braud and Durant, Administrators
of the Almshouse; Ducros, police-lieutenant;
Mr. de la Chapelle, Mr. Milhet the elder
Administrator; Mr. Milhet, junior; Mr. Hubert
Bellair; Braquet, Captain of Militia; Gauvier,
postmaster; Dupare, Bore, Lambert, Duforest,
Dijon, Fortier, Dubourg, Bertaud, Boudet,
Laliene, Guignant Robin, colonists;
Messrs. Beauillieu de Monplaisir, Menele,
Moujet, Lalune and other residents of note in
presence of whom, a memorial was read, explain-
ing the purpose of the meeting, which was to
deliberate upon proper ways and means to provide
funds for the settlement of the debt due by the
Capuchins to the Almshouse.

After all present had unanimously agreed that
the parishioners should provide the priest with
a rectory where he could be suitably lodged, or
pay his rent until such time as the Parish can
furnish him with a home, there being no special
funds reserved for that purpose, it was unanimo-
usly resolved to name a committee of six colonists
from the Parish to make an exact appraisement of
all properties owned by each parishioner, to be
able to pay one-half of the sum due for rent of
the house occupied by the Reverend Priest of this
Parish. Consequently a committee of six was ap-
pointed to make the said appraisement, as follows:

Messrs. Olivier de Vezin and Ducros, representing the city,
Messrs. de Reggio and De la Barre, representing the lower coast,
Messrs. Lebreton and Beaulieu representing the upper coast.

The said committee, after making a statement of the value of each property, shall assess each colonist in proportion to his holdings and collect a tax, totaling up to 2383 livres 6 sols 8 deniers, said tax to be collected in full this year from the residents of this Parish.

Respondent avers that Fournier & St. Pe are precluded by prescription from making new demands; that they have been sufficiently answered previously as to the allegation that Viviat did business for his own account; and that new demands do not constitute an answer by them to the proceedings introducing evidence; and he asks what they could answer to the original statement of Nouveau, or the invoices held by Datchurut (appearing on said statement) and covering the merchandise entrusted to him for the Post of Vincennes.

Respondent avers that Fournier & St. Pe have spread the rumor that the merchandise had been intended for the Port St. Ange, and not for the Post of Vincennes, whereas they knew that the one post is known under both names.

Respondent admits that in the merchandise sent to the Post of Vincennes were included articles which did not belong to the cargo of the boat "L'Union", but he avers that it is the accepted usage at

Illinois to include extraneous objects because it is necessary to have miscellaneous merchandise in these trading expeditions, in order to do any business at all.

If Fournier & St. Pe have filed other pleadings, which have not been served on Respondent, which pleadings in any event are now prescribed, he prays that same may be dismissed, and he reiterates his former allegations made in the matter.

At 7 o'clock in the morning, my hired help named Capet, hunter and fisherman, discovered the body of a white man drowned in the river, below the uncultivated rice field of Sieur Valantin Bellut, pulled it into the field of Sieur Faure.

They advised me immediately.

After examining the corpse it was identified as that of Sieur Simon, the hired help of Sieur Valantin Bellut, missing since the 5th., of this month.

The inquest showed no signs of violence, and as he was found nude, it is presumed that he drowned trying to cross the river.

Sieur Valantin Bellut questioned concerning his relationship and named, stated he knew him to be a creole from Allemands where he had a brother named Nicola, but did not know him under any other name. Employed by the named Garelle resident down the river, and a sister, married to a bar pilot at the jetties, that is all that could be learned of his origin.

Sieur Bellut stated that all he had belonging to the deceased at his house was some clothing. After the declaration I had the said Simon buried, and notified the Commissary Ordonateur at New Orleans.

The letter gives an account of indigo sold at 3,027 livres, 2 sols, and statement of two letters of exchange drawn on them, declaring they will await the outcome of the colony's future before deciding on giving secured credit to anyone. The letter further states they appreciate the kindness of having recommended their house to Mr. Voisin and that Messrs. Rasteau are undecided as to whom they shall employ to succeed their brother.

In the year 1769, the twenty-second of November, we officer in command of the Post of St. Genevieve and its dependencies in lieu and stead of Monsieur de St. Ange de Bellerive, Captain in command at Illinois for his Catholic Majesty, pursuant to the letter addressed to us on the 19th of this month and by virtue of the orders directed to him (Bellerive) by his Excellency Monsignor Orrelly (O'Reilly) Commandant of Benfayan in the Order of Alcantara, Lieutenant General and Inspector General of the Armies of his Catholic Majesty, Captain General and Governor of the Province of Louisiana, by which we are commanded to take possession in the name of his Catholic Majesty of that portion of the Illinois Country to him ceded by his Most Christian Majesty, we therefore, after having called a meeting of all the inhabitants and subjects of said Post St. Genevieve and its dependencies under arms and having exhibited to them the orders directed to us, have taken and do by these presents take possession in the name of his Catholic Majesty of that portion of the Illinois country ceded by his Most Christian Majesty to his Catholic Majesty. In consequence we have ordered all the inhabitants of this said Post Genevieve who desire to yield to his dominion to repair to the Government office to take in our presence the oath of allegiance which his Catholic Majesty requires of his new subjects, declaring

to all those who refuse to take such oath of allegiance that they shall be compelled to leave this colony within the time accorded them, and have signed the said day and year.
